expires, and 89 days from the biennial general election, the Governor appoints a substitute. Now, does that substitute have a clear field and have the right to disfranchise the voters from voting for the others who have filed in the normal course? It would under this language, wouldn't it?

JUDGE ADKINS: The appointee in no event could serve beyond the unexpired term of the man whom he was replacing, and if his term expired, if you are envisioning a situation where people are filing for the new term, then the problem wouldn't arise.

MR. SYKES: I suggest the language doesn't say he can serve only the unexpired term in any event.

THE CHAIRMAN: Well, might we cover that by asking the Committee to take that suggestion into consideration?

DR. BARD: Certainly.

THE CHAIRMAN: Any further question on this Section? I suggest to you a possible histus that you might have an appointment. Two years before the end of the term, and the person who was appointed would have his
