splendidly the dilemma we faced in the subcommittee. We recognized there would be occasions when it would be necessary to call for the testimony of witnesses and for the production of records. We also recognized that there was the danger that such power could be abused. In dealing with these ambivalent concepts, we attempted to kind of balance the scale justly on both sides, and this is why we said, providing that the General Assembly shall by law protect.

Now, if you can improve the wording here, well and good. This was a very sensitive situation we had to deal with, and I would like Dr. Michener to comment on this whole question because at our Committee meeting, we talked at length in regard to the importance of this power and also the importance of safeguarding it.

DR. MICHENER: I don't want to say much. As
I recall from looking through the transcripts, this had
been discussed at some length before and the arguments
brought up for and against. The Legislature has to have
facts in order to draft and form meaningful legislation.
