subpoens records from the Executive Department, where you are dealing in economic affairs, and you have the subpoens power there. It seems rather stronge for the Legislature to give subpoens power to its agencies and not have it itself.

THE CHAIRMAN: Mr. Clagett?

MR. CLAGETT: I agree with Judge Adkins that this is a rather dangerous clause because it gives a certain amount of mandate here that the General Assembly shall by law protect, requested recorded and papers and the rights of witnesses, and what we are really driving at here is not to protect them from any and all demands or summonses but only from those which are unreasonable abuse; and maybe we can narrow this thing and do what we are trying to do here by adding the words, rights of witnesses, and after those words, from unreasonable abuse.

THE CHAIRMAN: Any further comment, discussion?
