THE CHAIRMAN: Mr. Clagett?

MR. CLAGETT: Mr. Chairman, picking up right there, I want to clarify the remarks that I made earlier because I thought when I was agreeing with Judge Adkins that I was agreeing that the General Assembly should have the power to compel the attendance of witnesses and the production of records, but I was trying to prevent the exercise and use of that power from an abuse.

I did not mean that it should be unduly restricted as it is now, eliminated, and I agree that I think we are approaching it from the wrong point of view. I am now satisfied in reading the language that the Committee has come up with here, that what we are doing is really doing the job that the General Assembly will have to wrestle with through an appropriate committee which can study the background and the deeds and necessities and do by law what we are attempting to do, by a search for words or phrases, either by restriction or by elimina-

tion.
