there now.

THE CHAIRMAN: It seems to me Mr. Case's point is well taken. If the Committee is to have any guidance, perhaps we ought to take a few votes on general principles as to what, if any, limitations there ought to be.

MRS. BOTHE: Mr. Chairman, I would not accept Mr. Case's statement. I am in no position to debate it, but I think the Committee should advise the Commission as to what the powers of the General Assembly are.

Now, Article III, Section 24, which is the one pertaining to the grand inquest does give the General Assembly the power, the House of Delegates the power to subpoena, et cetera. Nowhere else in the existing Constitution is the power referred to, and I think we have all proceeded on the assumption that without a constitutional grant, there is at least a doubt that a committee of the General Assembly could issue a valid subpoena.

MR. CASE: I can tell you right now that the Legislative Council has been doing it for a long time.
