MRS. BOTHE: I amend the motion. The motion was one of sense rather than language, but the intention was that this apply to each particular instance where the power is sought to be exercised.

THE CHAIRMAN: In other words, the suggestion is that each request of the Committee to require attendance of a witness or production of a document or a book or record require a vote of two-thirds of the appropriate House.

Any further discussion?

MR. CASE: May I ask a question? Does this mean that in general legislation where, for example, the State is establishing a board or agency and feels necessary to grant that board or agency subpoena powers, that that bill implementing this situation would require two-thirds vote.

 $$\operatorname{MRS.}$ BOTHE: I am speaking of procedures in the Legislature.

MR. CASE: So the result of what you are saying is that the Legislature has to get two-thirds of its

Members to vote for it, but it can grant it to any
