be compelled against his consent to appear or produce a document only by the two-thirds vote.

MRS. BOTHE: That is right. I wouldn't contemplate every time a witness is requested, he would have to be approved by the two-thirds majority.

THE CHAIRMAN: Any discussion?

DR. BARD: We are hopeful Congressman Miller will speak on some of the issues that arose in connection with the subpoena power and the necessity for it.

MR. MILLER: I was called away for a short time. I don't know where we have gotten.

THE CHAIRMAN: Let me state very briefly,

Mr. Miller. The statement has been made in the absence
of some provision in the Constitution, the Legislature
as a part of the exercise of the power of sovereignty
has the power to compel attendance of witnesses and books
and papers. Not all Members of the Commission are ready
to accept that at the moment, and the Committee is to
document it one way or the other.

What we are doing is taking a series of votes to take the sense of the Commission as to whether there
