when you set a specific target date that is not movable, you create problems. There are a goodly number of states that have operated under this general frame of reference, a continuous body.

You will note the length of the legislative session would be fixed by the Legislature itself. Legislature itself could determine how long it should sit in order to handle properly its increasing volume of business. For example, if the Legislature wanted to set by law a statement such as this one, which holds true-for Kentucky, that is now under a continuing body, it shall meet annually in regular session for no longer than 60 regular legislative days exclusive/Saturday, Sunday, and legal holidays; however, with concurrence of two-thirds of members elected to each House fixing a term in the same calendar year the General Assembly may meet for an extended period. The law could be written ro provide flexibility permitting each term to adjust the target date to the requirements rather than to set a target date that would be true at all times.
