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upon concurrence of two-thirds of all the senators, and then there would follow the language.

MR. CASE: Judgments in impeachment shall not extend further than removal from office, as in the Federal Constitution.

THE CHAIRMAN: I would like to comment that
I am very much puzzled by that addition, because I had
thought and I may be wrong about it, that impeachment
meant only one thing, removal from office.

DR. WINSLOW: No, no.

THE CHAIRMAN: If you have this, what power is there of the Senate to punish? What sort of punishment could it mete out?

DR. BURDETTE: Resolution of censure.

THE CHAIRMAN: Imprisonment?

DR. BURDETTE: No resolution of censure.

THE CHAIRMAN: I say could it be imprisonment?

MR. CASE: That would extend further than to the removal of office. I think it has to be something related to his office. He might be suspended, he might be, as Dr. Burdette said, censured, but it would all have
