the State government, and bond counsel said, I don't think this can be done because what we are doing here is using the State's credit in aid of a private institution, and this Section 34 says that you can't do that, and very frankly, it looked like a pretty good case, because the Hopkins is a private institution, the State's credit was going to be used, they were going out to borrow this money and turn the cash over to it, and it would seem that the taxpayer had a pretty cold case, but as often happens in the Court of Appeals in Maryland, as in other courts, and the Supreme Court of the United States, the result to be reached was more important than the technical arguments that were advanced by able counsel, and the Court said, Well, this is not credit that you are doing here, this is cash. You are giving cash. True, you are using your credit to get the cash, but by the time you have your transaction with the Hopkins, you are giving
