subject to the approval of the Board of Public Works and as provided by law, the State Treasury is authorized to make and sell short term -- well, temporary emergencies, but such notice must only be made to provide for appropriations already made by the General Assembly. Emergency financing, through the borrowing technique, was something that was used in the depression. It is not used today, as far as I know, because nothing is that big an emergency. As a matter of fact, the last time it was tried in Baltimore City, it was tried, and the City contitutional provision dealing with that has a provision similar to this, but the situation was down in South Baltimore, an old-time, it must have been pretty old, sewer main broke, and the result of that was that the was running down the gutter in this area, and the City Council sought to issue a series of notes because this was an emergency, to clean this mess up, and a taxpayer filed a suit, and the Court of Appeals said, Of course, everybody knows, there is no emergency here because that has been an old sewer line for years, and
