DR. BURDETTE: I have two comments that I should like to be enlightened about, if I may. The first, exactly the one that Dr. Winslow has brought up, and I remind the Chairman of the Committee that he himself was speaking yesterday about the constitutional theory that the State Constitution, as I understood him, has a limitation on powers, not a grant of powers because the State has all the power except as it may be limited. would say I am somewhat unhappy about saying in the Constitution that the State has power to incur indebtedness when it certainly does; while the former Constitution specifies, and I gather the Chairman of the Committee thinks it is inadequate, 34, no debt shall hereinafter be contracted by the General Assembly.
