I think the problem is that you have got this problem of the plenary power of the Legislature in the State, even in the absence of any express statement here, or at least the possibility, and I would think also that because of this problem of plenary State powers, the negative form of expression which would imply the recognition of those powers, and the use of the word except, which would definitely limit the Section to the positive results that the Committee wants to achieve would be the best method of drafting, and in order to make progress and bring the thing before the floor, I would move that the first sentence of the draft be amended to read as follows: The State shall incur indebtedness, except for a public purpose and in such manner and upon such terms and conditions as the General Assembly may prescribe.
