subdivision, could the State step in and make it a 1 2 general obligation? I think it probably could, but 3 MR. CASE: that wouldn't come under this Section. It would come under 4 the first sentence. There the State would go ahead 5 and incur the indebtedness, issue bonds, and pay them off. 6 MR. SAYRE: There is nothing to prevent it, 7 though, from coming under this Section if the General 8 Assembly so decided, is there? 9 MR. CASE: No. I think that is probably right; 10 11 assuming now it is public purpose. 12 MR. SAYRE: Yes. THE CHAIRMAN: Mr. Case, let me as you a ques-13 14 tion then with repsect to the last sentence. MR. CASE: Which is as I think it should be. 15 THE CHAIRMAN: Is it the intention of the Com-16 mittee that the last sentence is referring only to 17 private individuals, associations, or corporations? 18 MR. CASE: It is to any individual, association, 19 or corporation, as I interpret it. Of course, that language 20
