public purpose is served. In other words, the State credit could be given to a private corporation under this if a public purpose is served.

THE CHAIRMAN: That is not my question. Is it intended by the Committee that the last sentence beginning in Line 17 could apply to a political subdivision?

MR. CASE: I don't see why not. It would be a corporation. If a public purpose were served, I think the State could lend its credit.

THE CHAIRMAN: Then I think we ought to point out, because I am not sure that it is entirely clear to the Members of the Commission, that the gift or loan of assets or credit under this last sentence is not subject to the limitations in the preceding part of the Section. It is not intended to be.

MR. CASE: Maybe it would be helpful, Mr.

Chairman, because in my presentation I said that I would come back to this Section with somewhat more of a detailed explanation, if you would permit me, or if the Commission would like me to do so, to restate briefly the problem that it involved here and the areas of resolution that
