of the word, credit, does not include indebtedness as such. It does include, of course, the possibility that indebtedness might be incurred at a later time.

THE CHAIRMAN: Dr. Bard?

DR. BARD: I have two questions for the Chairman to educate me. In general, an outstanding indebtedness, a person can easily enough find out what is the outstanding indebtedness of the State of Maryland. Would one be able to find out fairly easily the outstanding endorsements of credit, the extent of it? Would there be statutory limits to it, and your answer to the question would permit me to respond, if I might, Mr. Chairman, on my view in respect to twenty-five years, twenty-five year limitation.

MR. CASE: What we call the bond circular, which is, in effect, a prospectus given to potential purchasers of bonds, will traditionally show contingent obligations, particularly in the case that we have been, or the cases that we have been talking about here today, namely, the dormitory. What you would find would be this one page general obligation debt, which would be the
