We know that this will not take place by the mere nature of the statute. The statute will have a possible opening in case of situations such as the Cooper-Hughes Bill. At present we don't have it, I think if you set up 90 days, there is no point in calling/a continuing body.

MR. MILES: I am lost to know what this has to do with the Cooper-Hughes Bill. Whether the session had been 20 days longer or 30 days longer, I think the unfortunate thing there was it didn't start
