And this, as I said earlier, is much, much broader really than what your Committee in this instance has suggested.

I think that it would be not just one step, but a thousand steps backward to withdraw from the State the right to use its credit to assist in these programs, some of which we know now, such as Slum Clearance, Urban Renewal and so on; some which may come later, such as the guaranteeing of loans for home owners or a restrictive class of home owners, such as workers, and that kind of thing.

This is a modern technique. It is being used now and will be used more, I believe, in the future.

As far as the balance sheet argument is concerned, it is true, of course, that these items would not show up under direct debt, but Prince George's County and Montgomery County have for many years used their credit to guarantee the obligations of another political entity, namely the Washington Suburban Sanitary Commission, and this has worked to the advantage not only of the two Counties, but the State as well, in the creation of the bi-County and
