any arbitrary time limitation is going to foul up the 1 practicalities of the situation and any feeling of safe-2 guard it gives to somebody who shares the misgivings I 3 expressed is purely delusive. 4 I think that the only meaningful safeguard 5 that you can have is a call for an extraordinary vote, 6 so at least there is something to impress people with the 7 seriousness of what is being done, and I think that there 8 ought to be at least as much of a vote in this situation, 9 with all the dangers involved, as there is necessary to 10 override a veto of the Governor, and I would suggest that 11 the possible solution to the problem, in light of the 12 tenor of the Commission's discussion, would be to leave 13 out any time period or any single arbitrary description 14 and to put in the requirement of a two-thirds vote of the 15 entire elected membership of either house and I would amend 16 the motion, if I may, to so provide. 17 MRS.
