

1 That motion carries, 11 to 9.

2 MR. CASE: Wait a minute. We've got two votes.

3 THE CHAIRMAN: I'm sorry, that's right.

4 DR. BARD: We don't know how they would vote
5 on that. They just want 25.

6 MR. CASE: I would say they vote the same way.

7 DR. BARD: I don't think so.

8 DR. BURDETTE: May I say that I would change
9 my vote -- we've had no debate on this. I voted for it
10 only because I understood Mr. Case to say that 40 years
11 is quite enough. I realize he moderated it somewhat,
12 enough is enough. Does he fear that it might be 70 years,
13 with another 30, 40 years?

14 MR. CASE: I said, frankly, that I thought, as
15 of now, presently, 40 years would not unduly hamstring the
16 General Assembly in any program that we now visualize, but
17 if we are writing a document for a number of years without
18 amendment, I think it is a wrong thing to do.

19 DR. BURDETTE: I'm inclined to vote against the
20 limitation.

21 THE CHAIRMAN: I think the agreement we had with
