most of you are troubled by, but I feel there has got to be some kind of limitation on what otherwise would be the unlimited extension of credit. This is just a device, and I am not sure it is the best device, but I think it is perhaps at least some sort of restriction.

I therefore vote for the motion, although I must confess that I see the possibility that bond counsel and other mere lawyers will have a heyday in determining in some situations whether the bill is one extending the credit and hence, whether it was passed by the requisite majority.

Are you ready for the question?

MR. CASE: It is going to foul us all up, no doubt about that.
