to the end, provided further that nothing in this section shall be construed to prohibit the raising of funds for the purpose of aiding or compensating in such manner or way those citizens of the State who have served with honor their Country, and so forth, not particularly favoring that, but because the report itself did not reflect it, in light of the interpretation given today that the first sentence is a limitation to be construed only for a public I think we might get a comment from the Committee. in light of their recommending the deletion of this provision, whether or not they interpret this to be an explicit denial of such a provision under a non-public purpose doctrine or whether they would simply just leave this kind of provision to the courts for construction, as to whether or not it is a public purpose.

MR.CASE: The latter.

THE CHAIRMAN: There is another question implicit in the deletion of that same provision that I think the record ought to have your comment on, Mr. Case, and that is the fact that in the provision in the existing Constitution which expressly authorized a veterans bonus,

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
