Constitution, it does not necessarily affect any past history.

THE CHAIRMAN: Not necessarily.

MR. BROOKS: The only question raised by this is the need seen in at least twelve States where similar provisions of a different nature have been introduced in the Constitution. They have also had these riders protecting prior debts. So, there has been some thought in some States that such clauses were necessary.

THE CHAIRMAN: Mr. Sachs'

MR. SACHS: John, I think you will find, and correct me if I'm wrong, in those situations they were amendments to debt and credit sections of existing Constitutions and not complete revisions. It seems to me this is going to be a general, whether it's in the new Constitution or not, a general understanding in the new Constitution as to the previous practice, across the board, but in those instances my investigation indicated it was only where they focused on this section in the other Constitutions and felt they had to make some special provision because it was the only problem that was being
