experts on or attached to the Rules Committee, is more competent to deal with court procedure than is the General Assembly, especially in view of pressure under which it traditionally works.

Accordingly, it is my believe that the Court should have the final say.

However, if your Commission concludes otherwise,

I have this suggestion to make. The General Assembly could
be prohibited from changing the Maryland Rules by implication or by legislation which cuts across the rules without
regard to its impact and require that any legislative
amendment to the Rules set out in detail the Rule or
Section thereof intended to be changed.

Now, that is Judge Gray's letter and, of course, the significant part of it is the one sentence paragraph which says, accordingly, it is my believe that the Court should have the final say.

Now, I might also ask Mr. Sykes of our Committee to state his views on this, which were given to the Committee and, of course, considered by the Committee when we decided to repropose the alternate contained on Page 31.
