A judge who retires shall have the privileges provided by law. A judge removed shall have the benefits, pension or retirement allowance otherwise accruing from his judicial service to the extent, if any, provided by the order of removal, and that was done because there may be reasons that not all of his pension may be revoked, a pension that he or his wife are entitled to. There may be circumstances under which he is removed which would make that penalty perhaps too extreme.

We are giving discretion to the Supreme Court to decide, on removal, what other penalties shall be imposed upon a judge insofar as his loss of pension and other retirement rights.
