a judge is removed from office for misconduct in office or other similar thing, that his right to a pension shall be as provided in the order of removal, because we thought it very inappropriate and very difficult to define by law or anything, before the facts, what the penalty ought to The circumstances under which a judge would be removed from office will vary from time to time. In some cases, the stripping of his retirement benefits may be appropriate. In other cases, it may not be, particularly. I see your problem, but wouldn't MR. SAYRE: it be -- I was just thinking here, after fifteen years of meritorious service, a judge then suddenly becomes a very bad man and he is removed for cause, but he has acquired pension rights and survivorship rights. You are leading up to rule how this is being handled. MR. MARTINEAU: We leave it up to the sentence of the court, in effect.

MR. SAYRE: Couldn't this be done by law,
where by law you leave it to rule? In other words, leaving
this aspect to law, you can do it that way, but it -THE CHAIRMAN: I think you are talking in cross
