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20 21 literally is that four or five geographic sections of the state could name the whole Legislature if it wanted to.

THE CHAIRMAN: He would be elected by the people of the district. He just need not be a resident of the particular district.

MR. MILES: Just as bad.

THE CHAIRMAN: It may be.

DR. BARD: I would remind you, Mr. Chairman, and , Mr. Miles, that this holds true for Congressional representation now in Maryland. Is that not true, Congressman Miller?

MR. MILLER: So I understand.

MRS. FREEDLANDER: No provision in the United States Constitution for that.

DR. BARD: I want to be fair that our Committee was not as tightly united on this part as the first part but as far as Congressional representation is concerned, there are no qualifications.

THE CHAIRMAN: There is one qualification to the last comment which is that while there is no require-
