MR. BOND: And, of course, my point is that is not bad, because you have different pressures and different problems in Somerset or Garrett County than you do in Baltimore City or Montgomery County. I think that is the crux.

THE CHAIRMAN: I suggest to you there is another problem. I don't know how much it is involved, but as I understand it, the Committee on Political Subdivisions is considering some kind of a prohibition against local legislation or at least their objective is to take the legislature out of the business of making separate provisions for various counties.

Whether this would conflict actually with that provision, I don't know. It would conflict with the spirit of it, if they gave the Legislature the jurisdiction or authority to provide differently for the jurisdiction of the District Court in various places throughout the State.

MR. CLAGETT: Well, Mr. Chairman, on that point, it would certainly require the utilization by the General Assembly of the power of classification, it seems to me, because otherwise it would be local legislation, as we
