MR. MARTINEAU: The term of the lay members provided first of all in C-1 for the terms of the judicial courts, four years, and in C-2 the terms of the non-judicial members as provided for by law.

THE CHAIRMAN: Mr. Sayre?

MR. SAYRE: There is a question here. Can you have a conflict of interest arising for other than judicial offices as you might envisage them?

MR. MARTINEAU: Conflict of interest is always the action of a member of a commission vis-a-vis some other public office to which he might be appointed, and the difficulty is always using your vote with respect to one to gain the other, and this is what we are at least trying to prevent by putting the six-month limitation in.

MR. SAYRE: Yes, but my question is, is the judicial office the only type of office?

MR. MARTHEAU: Obviously, no.

MR. SAYRE: And this would be an unrealistic restriction?

MR. MARTINEAU: Particularly for lay members, you would be alleviating this prohibition for the lay
