and Stats decisions as a person residing on a Government hospital or somewhere like that is pre-empted from voting in Maryland under the constitution. to clear up that point. It is a very important one to a lot of people.

If the new constitution does MR. SAYRE: not deny that right -- I can imagine where you preclude on purpose people in mental hospitals or prisons.

MR. MILLER: People on the staff at Perry Point have been ineligible to vote since World War I because they occupy quarters supplied by the Federal Government on the grounds. They have to serve on juries, pay state income taxes, not allowed to vote.

THE CHAIRMAN: Mr. Sayre's point was, I think, why couldn't this be left to the Legislature? I think the answer is the Committee indicated at the last meeting they thought this was important enough not to leave to the Legislature.

MR. MILLER: I think also there was an opinion some years ago of the Attorney General that the Legislature couldn't correct it.
