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as provided by law, here we are saying the General
Assembly may by law. Do we mean a distinction? Could
this be done by joint resolution in the General Assembly?

MR. RUSSELL: No.

THE CHAIRMAN: I think this would be a question of style. The same phrase is used in several other sections. One of the Committees we had a report from last session used that and we had a long discussion about it. I think the question then was left to the Committee on Style, was it not, Professor Burdette? This really is stylistic. I don't think your Committee meant to imply an action by the General Assembly that did

MR. RUSSELL: No, we did not contemplate that.

MR. HOFF: One other thing. The word adjudi-

cated relating to mentally incompetent persons, half our institutions are filled with people who have not been adjudicated insane.

not require approval of the Governor.

MR. SAYRE: That was my very question.

MR. HOFF: That is my point.

THE CHAIRMAN: You mean somebody could be
