misdemeanor is not very meaningful. THE CHAIRMAN: And it is largely statutory. Mr. Sayre? Well, two years ago, very shortly MR. SAYRE: after this book came out, I wrote to the Director of the National Municipal League asking just what that sentence meant and he sent back a letter, I haven't the slightest idea. Write Professor so and so, of Columbia University, which I promptly did and I have yet to hear from him. However, Dean Fordham defined it MR. CLAGETT: and answered it possibly a little more conclusively, but along the same lines I attempted to answer here and he felt actually it was a proper restriction to place upon the broad grant of power to the counties and I have more or loss translated it to have some meaning to my mind with reference to the exercise of, let us say, water and sewer as it crosses an individual's property and, really, the last provision, where you have a misdemeanor in the form
