problems, allowing these multitudinous problems that arise in every area to be handled locally or otherwise by the local law or by the charter.

Now, we're going to have more and more problems that local governments have to face which through its own ingenuity should be able to face, unless a solution comes from the General Assembly. There is nothing that prevents the General Assembly taking the initiative also, and then there is a third consideration here.

Under reapportionment, I think this is an important consideration for the rural area, where perhaps the vote has been taken away from the Legislature on one hand, the local people in the sparse areas have then obtained a power to act that they didn't have before, and I think that this new balance, our Committee would like passed, at least for experimentation, because there is nothing that would prevent it from going back, if this system was unworthy.

MR. BROOKS: I think this recommendation is one of the most important recommendations before the Commission in the consideration of the proposed new draft of a
