

1 THE CHAIRMAN: Mr. Sayre?

2 MR. SAYRE: In this sentence that encompasses  
3 population, I personally would say if you use population,  
4 I would want this reference to the latest census. If you  
5 said based upon population and upon such other criteria,  
6 would that -- would that --

7 MR. FREEDLANDER: It's not and. It's for.

8 MR. SAYRE: That's what I'm saying. If you had  
9 population and, that justifies the reason for population.

10 THE CHAIRMAN: Mr. Clagett?

11 MR. CLAGETT: It would be contrary to the an-  
12 nounced position and the preference, as I understand it,  
13 of the City. I believe that actually again we go back to  
14 giving the General Assembly a free hand. This would be  
15 more restrictive because it would require a dual basis of  
16 some kind, rather than a single one, although I can't push  
17 it too far.

18 THE CHAIRMAN: I'd like to ask Dr. Loevy a ques-  
19 tion. Dr. Loevy, in your research in the situations that  
20 you mentioned before, where legislatures in other states  
21 had the power based on population, based classification on
