THE CHAIRMAN: Mr. Sayre?

MR. SAYRE: In this sentence that encompasses population, I personally would say if you use population, I would want this reference to the latest census. If you said based upon population and upon such other criteria, would that -- would that --

MR. FREEDLANDER: It's not and. It's for.

MR. SAYRE: That's what I'm saying. If you had population and, that justifies the reason for population.

THE CHAIRMAN: Mr. Clagett?

MR. CLAGETT: It would be contrary to the announced position and the preference, as I understand it, of the City. I believe that actually again we go back to giving the General Assembly a free hand. This would be more restrictive because it would require a dual basis of some kind, rather than a single one, although I can't push it too far.
