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out how much they needed, and then he would take that matter to the Legislature as a subject and would get an appropriation from them, based on whatever he could get out of them for that particular thing.

In 1916, a great revolution took place in this State, and because it was in that year that the socalled Budget Amendment was adopted as a result of a reform commission's work that established one of the first, if not the first truly strong executive budgets in the country, and with slight modifications, but important modifications, this system has continued from that time.

In the course of the work that our Committee did in this particular subject. I had occasion to have a very interesting conversation with Dr. Clark Alberg, who was the former Budget Director of the State of New York and is now the Executive Vice-president of Syracuse University, who I knew in other connections, and Dr. Alberg has told me, and I just cite him as an example, that the method of doing things here in Maryland budgetwise
