of money, and therefore they claim that there is some scientific procedures used here, and I am willing to admit that there are, but they admitted quite candidly at our hearings that they consciously overestimated.

THE CHAIRMAN: Mr. Sykes?

MR. SYKES: I just wanted to get clear, too. Under the current practice, there are a number of controls in practice that the Governor's Budget Department and the Governor through them actually exercise over the school budget? It isn't as if the Executive Department has no power whatsoever.

MR. CASE: That is absolutely correct.

MR. SYKES: Is it also true that there is nothing in the draft of language in the new Constitution that you propose which is intended in any way to curtail the powers that the executive is currently exercising in respect to the school budget?

No. 'It is to sharpen those powers MR. CASE: and make them a little more definitive, if anything.

THE CHAIRMAN: Any further comment?

MRS, FREEDLANDER: To answer Mr. Scanlan again,
