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That is part of the problem. THE CHAIRMAN: I don't know that that meets Mr. Haile's point.

THE CHAIRMAN: It might. Let's take a tenminute break.

(At this time a short recess was taken.)

DR. JENKINS: The law does not provide it.

THE CHAIRMAN: Mr. Case, do you want to reply further to Mr. Haile's question?

MR. CASE: Mr. Haile asked whether or not this was intended to apply to purely public schools or would private schools come within the ambit of the language? I answered that it was intended, certainly as always to have been used as a vehicle for financing public schools only. However, and I must confess that for that reason, our Committee did not consider the necessity for inserting the word, public, between the words, local and school.
