courts and at that time the Legislature in its infinite wisdom may wish to include private schools within the particular financing scheme that we have here, and it seems to me that the use of the word, public, would prevent this, and I don't think we are ready to make that judgment now.

THE CHAIRMAN: Mr. Sykes?

MR. SYKES: I would like to know whether you are actually correct in your statement of the effect of this provision. As I read the provision, it deals only with the very limited question of whether the Governor has any revisory power over the budget, and I would assume that the reason why the Governor is to have no power over the public school system is that it is a public system and should be kept as free of political influence as possible. There is nothing in this language as I read it that would prevent the Legislature, by the normal process, prevent the State by the normal process, from aiding private schools, but the question is whether there should be a distinction made as between public and private schools as to how far the Governor as governor is to be hamstrung.
