permitting, and that is about all you can say for it,
the Governor, in the course of sending down his budget,
to send down with his budget, a budget message and of
course, this, as most of you know, is done. Not only is
there a very detailed message, but the Governor makes a
State of the State speech, which is, in effect, a summarization of the budget.

We didn't include anything in our draft on this particular point because we felt that this was a prerogative of the Governor and to say in the Constitution that he could do it was merely declaratory of his inherent powers as the Chief Executive Officer of the State. When it comes to the supplements or amendments, we felt that here there ought to be a spotlight cast on it, because the Governor is doing something perhaps as an afterthought, and therefore, based on the underlying philosophy, if not the direct recommendation of the Sobeloff Commission, because we felt that their way of getting at it was not proper, namely, to eliminate the right to amend, we preserved the right to amend, but required the Governor to say just what he is doing so the Legislature can tell
