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Mr. Martineau's point is well taken that under the existing constitutional provision as to judges you would need an election every two years.

MR. GENTRY: Why would you need them every two years for judges?

THE CHAIRMAN: You wouldn't need them but a judge instead of holding office two years on appointment could hold office four years.

DR. BURDETTE: Let me raise a couple questions

if I may, Mr. Chairman. Of course, I said at the last meeting we discussed this that this is a reflection of Congressional law which fixes this time as the period in which members of Congress would be elected. If we should have in the next decade a four-year term for members of Congress, this might become passe. I wondered if we ought to use --

THE CHAIRMAN: Would it in view of the election of a third of the Senate every two years?

DR. BURDETTE: You are correct, it would not save for the fact that every now and then, I guess, every six years we don't have one as we don't have one
