to have the right, in view of the fact that it is representing the people and this is the people's money that is being spent, it ought to have the right to call on the people who are applying for and are going to spend the State money to come down and tell the General Assembly what is going to be done with this money. I think it is a very fundamental right.

MR. SYKES: As a practical matter, I think that the addition of this language would make the Section more palatable to me, but I don't think it would make it completely palatable. I think the objections would still hold, because as a practical matter, the Legislature has this right, since it can say, if you don't come down, we aren't going to give you the money you want.

THE CHAIRMAN: Any further discussion on the amendment?

DR. BURDETTE: A parliamentary inquiry. How do I vote to preserve my preference for the language that the Committee has, preferably with Mr. Case's amendment, but if I can't get that, I would like to have at least as much as Mr. Sykes moves for.
