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of the Declaration of Rights, which flow into the tax area, such as the lottery, such as the special assessment afforded to farm properties, such as the sites of taxation, et cetera. That is in the Third Report yet to come, and we have discovered, unfortunately and belatedly, that there is a big gap in this whole program which has been sort of the result of an Alphonse and Gaston act between Judge Adkins' Committee and mine. This deals with the question of an appropriate fiscal officer or agendy be designated in the Constitution to receive revenues. We talked today about outgo, which is very important, but we have not yet approached the problem of who gets the money in the first place, and Judge Adkins and his reporter and Mr. Sachs and I had dinner last night and discussed this matter until a fairly late hour, and this is going to have to be the subject, I am afraid, Mr. Chairman, of a Fourth Report, so the question is really one of how much can you expect the poor girl to do?

THE CHAIRMAN: Mr. Clagett?

MR. CLAGETT: I am seconding Mr. Sayre's motion, notwithstanding the protest that I am listening
