small counties in the state and perhaps not have too much trouble getting your half of 5 per cent.

MR. CLAGETT: Remember that referendums are not particularly favored anyway. So the difficulty here is in line with that thought, I would say.

MR. MITCHELL: Mr. Chairman, I move that the Committee be requested to prepare another provision relating to referenda in view of the possibility of a classification of counties where the Act may apply to fewer than all of the counties in the state. There should be -- is that clear?

THE CHAIRMAN: Mr. Mitchell, that is a matter that was discussed a number of meetings ago probably before you came on the Commission. I would have to rule this would be a reconsideration and submit to a vote without debate the question of whether it should be reconsidered. Is there a second to the motion? You understand that Mr. Mitchell's motion is that the Committee be instructed to consider as an alternate or addition to a statewide referendum a means of referendum limited to a locality where the law
