Add to section 8 where we are talking about rules of procedures, the matter of a quorum, for instance, twelve would be a rule of procedure. Keeping a journal is a procedure rule.

MR. SCANLAN: Keeping of a journal is, I think, of a difference, it rises beyond the ordinary procedure rule situation. Making the proceedings of the Convention public it seems to me is important enough to warrant a special statutory provision. As Mr. Hargrove reminded me, it is not only to inform the public and those interested, but also to provide a legislative history of these important proceedings. I think rather than being sandwiched in a long section which deals with the power of the Convention to prescribe its procedural rules, its organization, that the duty of the Convention to keep a journal and publish it, make it available is something that warrants separate treatment.

THE CHAIRMAN: I might remind you the Constitutional Convention of 1867 decided not to do this.

MR. SCANLAN: Not to do what?
