or each ballot label such appropriate ballot title or
titles as the Attorney General of the State shall
determine. Does that carry an inference that the Attorney
General could decide that this Constitution is separable

THE CHAIRMAN: I suppose not.

and people could vote on Part A, Part B, Part C?

DR. BURDETTE: But in any event, has the Committee considered leaving to the Convention the power to do that if it wanted to?

MR. SCANLAN: Do what if it wanted to?

DR. BURDETTE: To divide the Constitution in such fashion that it could be separated into parts. In some states this has been necessary in order to get the Constitution adopted. This is the thing that defeated the Constitution of New Jersey when it was first drafted because it was submitted in blocks. Various parts accumulated enough enemies to defeat it. This is only a question of strategy but should it be left to the Convention.

MR. SCANLAN: Answering your several questions in a row, there is no question that the convention would
