THE CHAIRMAN: Pinball machines in Southern Maryland might be another.

DR. BURDETTE: We could perhaps get a new

MR. CLAGETT: That would get it through without trouble.

Constitution in a noncontroversial section if we separated the controversial ones from it. But I don't think we ought to prejudge this. I think we ought to leave it to people like us who are in the Convention, the privilege to deal with this as in their judgment seems equitable. I would have faith that they would not engage in sharp practice because that would be self-defeating. They would try to separate the things out that would not destroy the body of the Constitution.

MR. SAYRE: I would take the opposite

approach in that if there are these difficulties in the Convention I assume the Convention would compromise, bring out a document. If you leave it where one part may be accepted and another part rejected, you don't have an integrated Constitution. I think you got to submit one document.
