stated that the Legislature had the inherent power to call a Constitutional Convention independently of Article 14, Section 2. My recollection is that his opinion said for the purpose of altering by amendment or rewriting the Constitution, I don't mean those precise words.

MR. BROOKS: There is a fine line, you might say, between amendment and drawing a new Constitution in that even if you wanted to adopt only the budgetary provisions, you could do it, if not by amendment, by submitting a new Constitution that is precisely like the old except this exception.

MR. CASE: I appreciate that and certainly that would be the technical way around it, but certainly it flies in the very teeth of the existing Constitution, as far as amendments are concerned.
