

1 speak, and rules of operations and things of that sort that
2 have to be taken under consideration. It seems to me
3 that it would be to the advantage of the Convention itself
4 if they have somebody that has something in their hand
5 and from there to let the Committee make whatever changes
6 they want.

7 THE CHAIRMAN: Mr. Miller?

8 MR. MILLER: I disagree a little bit about the
9 procedure because if we draw up a set of rules and the
10 Committee adopts them, presumably if they are a new set
11 of rules even though there are many things in them that
12 are in other rules of order, the Committee, the Convention
13 will start without precedent and the parliamentarian will
14 have to construe every phrase. I think we would be in a
15 better position if we recommend to the Commission that
16 they select some well established rules of order, and then
17 modify them to fit the occasion, but in so doing, they
18 would have a background of, in some cases, generations of
19 experience as to what is relevant and what isn't. The
20 parliamentarian would have, not have to make a complete
21 research on every point that may develop. Personally, I
