together and starting on Page 15, they are reproduced again with the commentary. Proposed Section 1. It says, The State shall encourage the advancement of knowledge; wherefore, the General Assembly shall appropriate funds for a system of public education at all levels as it deems desirable, to foster, enhance and promote the intellectual, cultural and occupational development of the people.

This proposed Section, one to which a sample

was made and attached by Mrs. Freedlander, would incorporate the sentiment and admittedly it is a sentiment expressed now in Article 43 of the Declaration of Rights and also would be a nudge to the General Assembly to support all manner of education in the State to the extent possible. It is a recognition of the tremendous expansion of education, public education, since the 1867 Constitution which planned and thought and gave the concept of the grade school. We had not recommended that community colleges, kindergartens, adult education or any particular phase of higher or lower education other than the University of Maryland which comes next be recognized as such in the Constitution.
